MCC Faculty Awards

The Drowning Prevention Coalition of Arizona recently recognized MCC's dean of academic instruction, Carol Achs, for her outstanding work in the community to prevent drowning and increase water safety education.

Carol Achs, Water Watchers at Phoenix Children's Hospital and Mesa Community College, received the President's Award. She founded Water Watchers with her daughter Druann Letter after her grandson, Weston, drowned in a backyard pool in 1998. The organization, established to teach children how to be safe around water, developed the concept of "Water Safety Day," which is now widely known as the kick-off event for the season.

Achs continues to be active in planning the

annual event, in addition to regularly speaking about how this tragedy affects a family and how preventable such an event can be. The President's Award is usually given by the president of the DPCA to recognize outstanding efforts in water safety.

Professor Nora Reyes received the 2010 Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) "Excellence in Education" Award. Reyes was presented the award at the RMHC Phoenix Scholarship Breakfast, which raised more than \$200,000 to help Arizona high school students attend college, making it one of the largest scholarship programs available to Arizona high school seniors. Ronald McDonald House Charities presents the "Excellence in Education" Award each year

to collegiate educators that exemplify commitment to education, innovation and leadership in the community.

MCC's Faculty Professional Development Coordinator, Shelley Rodrigo, was selected to attend the

Google Teacher Academy in London last July based on her passion for using innovative tools to improve teaching and learning. She was selected along with 50 other educators from all over the world. Upon completion, academy participants become Google Certified Teachers who share what they learn with other primary and secondary educators in their local region.

Jo Wilson, acting provost of MCC's Red Mountain Campus, was awarded Mesa's Woman of the Year Award for 2010. Wilson's exhaustive volunteer work, which extends her already long weeks as acting provost of the Mesa Community College Red Mountain

campus, was praised by Sally E. Downey, superintendent of the East Valley Institute of Technology.

"Jo is an outstanding role model for younger members of our community," Downey said. "She is a woman of quiet strength who demonstrates leadership, commitment and high achievement in her everyday life."

Wilson's late parents, Wilma and Warren Langfitt, are former recipients of the award.

President's Corner

Studies of the community college movement confirm that our unique open-access, community-focused educational institutions are a remarkable success. Yet, today community colleges across the nation are a focus of much criticism over college completion rates, including MCC.

Completion in higher education is typically measured by the number of students who earn a degree or certificate. A recent report measured completion by only including full time students who are attending college for the first time. At MCC, this is only 3% of our student population. While we take this criticism seriously and certainly want our students to obtain a degree or certificate, we also feel it's important to look at our entire student population.

Students come to MCC with different educational goals:

- 47% plan to transfer to another college or university
- 33% take courses to prepare to enter the job market, improve skills for a current job, or change jobs
- 16% take classes for personal interests
- 4% indicate intent other than those listed above.

Transferring to a university prior to achieving a two-year degree from MCC constitutes student success under MCC's mission, but these successes are not reflected in data collected for completion rates.

MCC's student population also includes a high percentage of students who come to us under prepared for college-level work. Next to this article I've included data on MCC's fall 2010 student profile. MCC is committed to working with other educational institutions to focus energy and resources on answering the call by President Obama to increase graduates by five million by 2020. FALL 2010 STUDENT PROFILE

- **Student enrollment** – all sites: 26,408 (35% or 9,224 were new to MCC)
- **Average age:** 26; age breakdown – < 17 (2%) 17-20 (34%) 21-30 (43%) 31-40 (11%) 41-50 (6%), >50 (4%)
- **Gender:** 52% female 47% male 2% undecleared

- 8,893 (34%) of students are full-time
- 17,515 (66%) of students are part-time

- More than 200 international students (on a student visa) from 50+ different countries
- 69% (4,337 of 6,252 testing) of all students completing placement testing, tested into at least one

- 15,683 students (59%) reported working in addition to attending classes. 9,660 students (37%) enrolled reported working more than 20 hours a week.
- 11,786 students (45%) are first generation college attendees.

Sorting Through Sustainable Efforts at MCC


“Congo/Women, Portraits of War: The Democratic Republic of Congo,” a traveling photography exhibit, is on view at Mesa Community College's Southern and Dobson Campus from Feb. 17 through March 11.

The exhibit and educational campaign raises awareness of the widespread sexual violence facing women and children in the Democratic Republic of Congo. The exhibition features powerful life-size photographs that convey the strength and courage of Congolese women. Accompanying essays contextualize the impact of the crisis from a range of perspectives.

“The Congo is the most dangerous place in the world for women,” said Ivy Esquibel, director of the MCC Psychology Instructional Resource Center and one of the organizers bringing the event to campus. “Millions of people were killed there in the last decade and yet it slips under the radar.”

Esquibel hopes the exhibit accomplishes two goals: to raise awareness and to encourage individuals to take positive action.

Traveling Photo Exhibit on Congo Coming to MCC

Addario, Marcus Bleasdale, Ron Haviv and James Nachtwey, tell the story of daily life in the Congo – political, economic, cultural, medical and personal.

The photos show women, along with their families, who have survived oppressive dictators, the violent passage to democracy, economic crises, and an ongoing struggle of regional and tribal warfare. These challenges have been accompanied by lack of both general and reproductive healthcare, HIV/

AIDS, and extreme sexual violence against women and children of all ages.

Essays accompany the photographs and provide a context for understanding this humanitarian crisis.

“The crisis is not just damaging to women and children,” Esquibel said. “It’s also damaging the souls and psyches of the men and boys.”

“I want people who view the exhibit to leave with a hopeful message,” Esquibel said. “We want to encourage them to take action and make a positive difference in the lives of the Congolese people.” For more information on the Congo, including how to help, visit mesacc.libguides.com/congo_women.

CONGO/WOMEN PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBIT AT MESA COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Under the energetic supervision of MCC's Environmental Sustainability Coordinator, Suzi Dodt, MCC saved an impressive amount of money and helped the environment immensely in 2010. The changes were based on the three R's: Reduce, Reuse and Recycle.

OFFICE SUPPLY REDISTRIBUTION:

Departments with office supplies that were no longer being used turned them over to the Recycling team for redistribution. The dollar value of office supplies that were redistributed at MCC was \$12,564. Reusing office supplies also saves other costs not able to be calculated, such as waste cost of sending all the old supplies to landfill, waste cost of packaging of new supplies, reduction of shipping fuel involved in the delivery of new items, and awareness of the value of reuse of items.

RECYCLING ESTIMATES:

Much effort was made to recycle trash to reduce the amount of tonnage sent to the landfill, which costs the college \$66.50 per ton.

SPECIFIC SAVINGS IN 2010:

- Paper: Average value for recycling 6 tons plus rebates: \$774.
- Cardboard: Average value for recycling 16 tons plus rebates: \$2,164.
- Cans/bottles: Approx. 25 tons recycled saved: \$1,662.
- Ink/toner cartridges: Earned \$640.

DUMPSTER DIVE:

To demonstrate how important sustainability efforts are, MCC held the 5th annual Dumpster Dive in November, using lawn space to conduct an audit of campus waste that is collected over a 24-hour period. MCC students teamed up with the Rhodes Junior High Environmental Club to participate in a modern-day archeological dig. Results of past Dumpster Dives have saved money and made a significant impact on the recycling efforts at the college.

MCC Outreach to the Community



Reynard the Fox

Mesa Community College's Theatre & Film Arts Department went on tour last semester with a children's play production to area elementary schools. The play, Reynard the Fox, was comprised of a cast and crew of MCC's theatre students, under the direction of MCC adjunct faculty

member Esther Brown. The production toured nine schools in the Mesa Public School District during October and November.

The idea for doing children's productions began with Kevin Dressler, co-director of theatre at MCC. Having worked in professional children's theatre companies, Kevin believed that it would provide good exposure for the college, plus marketable performance and technical experience for MCC's students. Esther Brown followed up with this idea and approached Rod Castillo, Creative Arts Director for Mesa Public Schools, who then promoted the production to the elementary schools. The production was originally offered for three days in November, but those dates sold out to the elementary schools so quickly that two additional performance days were added in October.

A side benefit of touring the production was that Reynard the Fox was most likely seen by more people than any other production in MCC's 40-plus year history.

Empty Bowls



This year's annual Empty Bowls Event at Mesa was a great success. The event raised \$21,000 for Paz de Cristo Community Center in Mesa. Paz provides anti-hunger and empowerment support for the East Valley's homeless, unemployed, working poor and their families.

MCC has been involved in Mesa's Empty Bowls event for about 20 years. It's a tradition that many art lovers look forward to each year. Attendees can buy a handcrafted bowl for a \$10 donation and dine on a lunch of soup and bread with proceeds going to the needy.
