#### 46 homes planned on 10.3 acres west of Alta Mesa

A subdivision plat, or map, has been approved for 46 homes on property just west of Alta Mesa at Higley and Brown roads.

The Mesa City Council on Nov. 3 voted 7-0 to approve the plat for Higley Heights Phase 3A on the west side of the 1400 to 1500 blocks of North Higley Road for 46 Residential Small Lot–4.5 Planned Area Development lots on 10.3 acres. KB Home Phoenix Inc. is the owner and Gail A. Morgan, EPS Group Inc., is the surveyor, according to the meeting's agenda.

Voting to approve the plat in a consent agenda were: Mayor John Giles; Vice Mayor Chris Glover, District 4; and councilmen Dave Richins, District 1; Alex Finter, District 2; Dennis Kavanaugh, District 3; David Luna, District 5; and Scott Somers, District 6 by phone

À preliminary plat for 431 lots on property on the northwest corner of Higley and Brown roads was approved in March, according to a memo provided to the council by John Weskley, planning director.

The city of Mesa held an open house Nov. 5 to introduce eight companies that have been selected to participate in The Business Academy at Launchpoint free entrepreneurship training program. Launchpoint is at 6113 S. Kent St. The companies are Alternative Education at Home; Claw Master LLC; Codes Unlimited; GoMechanic; Intelligent Analytics, LLC; Movement Interactive; Rapid Rescue, LLC and Thousand Themes LLC, according to a press release.

The city, in partnership with Arizona State University, created The Business Academy at Launchpoint as a free program to train entrepreneurs in a variety of methodologies, to validate business ideas and to position their companies for funding opportunities. The program begins this fall and runs through May 2015 and will be held at Launchpoint, according to the release

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will help these entrepreneurs develop their business and prepare their pitch for funding. The curriculum will be delivered in a series of modules with specific activities and tasks the participants will be required to complete. Key topics include customer discovery, product-market fit, team formation, mentor and advisor development, personnel management, pitch preparation, identifying and pursuing funding opportunities and networking, according to the release.

"The collaboration between the city of Mesa and Arizona State University to create Launchpoint will be on full display at this open house," District 6 Councilman Scott Somers said in the release announcing the event. "Being able to introduce the companies who are utilizing the services that we offer will really show off what Launchpoint is all about."

"And growing local businesses is an important component in building a strong, sustainable economy in Mesa."
