

Residency for Tuition: Quick Guide



All students are charged the out-of-state tuition rate at the time of enrollment. You then have the opportunity to submit documents to establish "Residency," which lowers your tuition to the in-state tuition rate. It is your responsibility to establish residency. To receive the reduced rate, the documentation must be provided before the end of the term in which you are enrolled. Any documentation received after the end of the term will be used to determine residency for subsequent terms. If you attend more than one college in the Maricopa County Community College District, proof of residency and citizenship or lawful status must be provided to each college.

* Disclaimer: Residency status for in-state tuition will not be applied retroactively to previous semesters, nor will a refund be given for the difference in tuition rates.

ID Authentication - How to Establish Residency

Providing <u>identification</u> is the first step to establishing residency. If your documents establish that you have lived in Arizona for the last 12 months, no further action is needed. The college will update your tuition rate typically within 10-15 business days.

If your documentation does not meet the requirements for in-state tuition, you may need to appeal for in-state tuition. Please see the different types of appeals and qualifying statuses on the chart below. Please contact <u>Enrollment Services</u> if you have questions about eligibility or the appeal process.

Dependent Student: If you are under 24 and considered a dependent by a parent, guardian, or spouse who is an Arizona resident, you can apply for in-state tuition by submitting a Dependent Domicile Affidavit. Permanent Resident: A student holding an AR-1 Permanent Resident Card that has been issued for at least one year and has established domicile in Arizona for one year may qualify for in-state tuition. PROP 308: Qualifying non-citizen Arizona high school graduates who attended an Arizona public or private high school or homeschool equivalent while physically present in Arizona for at least two years OR graduated from any public or private high school option or homeschool equivalent while physically present in the state OR obtained a high school equivalency diploma in this state may qualify.
